# **NEW ZEALAND NOTES AND COMMENTS by WARWICK PATERSON**

## ZEAPEX '80 - ALL THAT WE COULD HAVE WISHED

It had it all - New Zealand's greatest philatelic event. The stamps, the collectors, the clubs, the personalities, the fabulous rarities, the dealers, the public. Nine days of ceaseless activity, functions, meetings, awards, controversies, horse-trading, competitiveness, disappointments, glowing successes - everything which goes together to make a grand international exhibition: a few observations:

- \* Items from Her Majesty the Queen's collection were on display in the Court of Honour, including the amazing display of London Print Full Face Queens, Treasury Essays for the first postage stamps, and one of the world's greatest philatelic items, the 1847 Id. "POST OFFICE" MUNITIUS issue, used on envelope (valued at \$1,000,000) dated 21 Sept. 1847 the first known day of use. All were displayed due to the generosity of Her Majesty and Mr. John Marriott, Keeper of her stamp collection.
- \* The greatest surprise of the exhibition was when the Chairman, Mr. G.J. Ellott, revealed at the opening that Campbell Paterson Ltd., had not only located the world's rarest and most legendary stamp—the 1856 l¢ Black—on—Magenta British Guiana Provisional—but had arranged for it to be displayed throughout the exhibition. Last seen on 5th April 1980 in New York when it was auctioned for a fabulous \$850,000 (\$935,000 when you took in buyer's commission) it had now reappeared quite unexpectedly to make world philatelic news. I can confirm that the owner is one of our old friends but will remain, at his request, anonymous in the foreseeable future. Another chapter of mystery then is added to the romance of the l¢ British Guiana, as it may not be seen again in public for another six years at least. This is the stamp which Life magazine described in 1954 as "the most valuable object for its size and weight in the world" and of which another copy is said to have been purchased by the then owner, US millionaire Arthur Hind, for \$60,000 and promptly burned, to preserve the uniqueness of the present copy. Another chapter indeed, and one in which we at CP Ltd., were happy to play a part. All at the exhibition who had the chance to see it felt a sense of gratitude to the altruistic philatelist who had made it available to us at considerable cost to himself. May I say "thank you" for both the chance to see the Queen's collection and the l¢ British Guiana.

This was an experience to treasure. When asked at the official Banquet whether he possessed a 1d. Black First Day Cover, Mr. John Marriott, Keeper of the Queen's collection smiled wryly and back came the immediate response "No - but my boss has". And that was the tone which the 30,000-plus visitors must have sensed - enjoyment - at times hilarity - conviviality - involvement - the public face of the greatest hobby in the world. Something new for international exhibitions occurred. While it is often said that the dealers' and Post Office stands do a roaring trade at internationals and usually you could fire a camon ball between the frames of exhibits without hitting anyone, at Zeapex '80 the interest in the Class of Honour (previous Gold Medal winners) and the competitive entries was intense. Judging took place au concours and I found that sometimes merely seeing the frames was a major hurdle through the throng of public viewers.

All credit and praise then to Gerald Ellott and his team of tireless workers who made such a memorable show a reality. Congratulations too to all the medal and award winners, three of whom spring to mind.

## STANLEY GIBBON'S 1981 CATALOGUE

Make sure you're sitting down before you read it.

Once again "New Zealand" receives a dynamic boost from Gibbons. Some samples: Mainstream Full Face Queens (Davies Imperfs and perf 12½) take heavy increases in mint (from 45% to 80%) and in used (from 30% to 47%). SG.3 bisected used on cover more than doubles from £12,000 to £25,000 (\$60,000) and SG.1 London-printed ld. Deep Carmine Red 1855 doubles to £20,000 (\$48,000) unused, and from £5,000 to £8,000 (\$19,200) used. In one of the really big increases SG.3 quite justifiably goes from £2,000 to £5,250 (\$12,600), an increase of over 160%. An even more dramatic picture is seen when one plots the nett increase in the SG catalogue price of SG.1 mint from 1977 to 1981. In 1977 it reached £2,750 mint - today £20,000 - an increase of £17,250 (or 627% in a mere four years - did we once say NZ classics were undervalued? Look again at the superb CP Full Face listing for August. Some of the material is still available at prices which now two months later look positively laughable.

The 2/- and 5/- First Sidefaces go to £600, £600 and £675, £725 respectively. Again, the 5/- used of this issue has increased by over 1700% since 1977. The 8d. Second Sideface p.10 (adson) moves to £60 (\$144) mint - the other month we'd have sold you a block of four UHM for \$400 - ah me - never again. 4d. Terraces double used to £11 and the 5/- Mt. Cook (London) MINT which doubled every year for the three previous years, this time doubles yet again to £300. Increases of about 75% are general in the scarce exhibition stamps with the exception of 4d. Dunedin used, which more than doubles to £150. 50% plus is the rule for the early Healths (1931) pair now £320, £280 (\$768, \$672). SG have their heads in the sand for one issue, however - the 7d. Trans Tasman Blue now at £25, £32. The Aussie dealers will sell you UHM at \$200 (plus) these days. 28¢ Cook Bicentenary goes from £1.25, 40p to £6.00, £6.50 - one of the most spectacular individual increases.

The 2d. Brown-Red Life Insurance (no VR) goes from £450 (m) to £1300 and the ½d. Green Victoria Land rises to £800 from £350 (m and u) and at last SG have recognised the 5/- Mt. Cook Official (upright wmk.) which goes to £500 (m) from £225. Other new sterling prices (1980 levels in brackets) are ld. Dominion unsurfaced De la Rue paper £9 (m) (£2.75), 8d. Geo. V Official £225, £190 (£140, £110), 2/- Admiral (Cowan) £65, £14 (£35, £10), Geo. VI Official ½d. Brown £20 (m) (£5.50), QE II 2d. on ½d. "with stars" error £100, £130 (£80, £90) and 10/- on Horseback £40, £14 (£23, £9). Finally, at Zeapex such \$2 Multicolour (1968) as could be found were traded vigorously with dealers' quotes buying at \$90 selling \$110. SG underestimate it at £40, £22, but we'll excuse them that - tracking that stamp is like finding yourself at the back of the field at Ellerslie.

This year's innovation is the listing of stamps on cover to 1945 and the Crowned-Circle handstamps - both welcome additions.

## NEW ZEALAND CHALONS

12 (a) An interesting lot on a dozen or so leaves. There is a specialised collection of progressive damage to the pins in the early perf 12% perforating heads. There are multiples, 4d. Rose and all values are represented, some on cover. The advanced stage of damage gives stamps which almost appear imperf - e.g. a pair of ld. Orange (SG.112). There is another series of perf  $12\frac{1}{2}$  and 10 in compound and irregular compound. There are several examples of ld. Brown and 2d. Orange perf 10 at top only. There are imperf at sides (e.g. 6d. p.13 imperf vertically (large part of side stamps) and a large reconstructed mint multiple of 12 of 2d. Orange (retouch) which has been cut up (for early dealer's use?) 1/- Perf 13 double perfs, 1d. Brown, 2d. Orange, 4d. Yellow, 2d. Blue p.12½, p.13, all doubled are present. There are several part reconstructions of 2d. (Blue and Orange) plate 2 and two pages of superb huge margined singles of the "accidental imperfs" in all values except 4d. (20 examples). A page of Richardson prints (SG.8 pair - super, SG.5 fine, SG.13 fine etc., etc., also of perf 123 shade study with SG.45, SG.37 Blueish Slate (fine), ld. reprint pair, certificated SG.52, 3d. Roulette 7 etc., etc.).
